In a diverse primary classroom, the teacher designs a social studies unit on community helpers. [1, 392] Instead of focusing solely on traditional professions, the curriculum includes stories and examples of community helpers from various cultural backgrounds, genders, and abilities. Students explore how different communities



define and value roles such as caregivers, educators, and service providers, fostering inclusivity and broadening students' perspectives on societal contributions.

In an intermediate math class, the teacher organizes collaborative learning opportunities through group problem-solving activities. Students work in heterogeneous groups where each member brings diverse strengths and perspectives to the task. The teacher encourages peer tutoring and cooperative learning strategies, such as Think-Pair-Share or Jigsaw activities, promoting communication, teamwork, and mutual support among students of different abilities and backgrounds.
